First Sunday in Advent November 29, 2020 Living Faith Lutheran Church Davis Bay, BC

One of the themes of the four Sundays in Advent is "waiting"—waiting with hope and longing for the coming into the world of the Light of the World. Although it has a rather subdued tone (much of Advent music is written in the minor key), it is not a penitential season as is Lent. The colour of Advent, royal blue, is the colour of hope. The use of the Advent wreath and the lighting of one (more) candle each Sunday encourages us as we wait. Advent's Prayers of the Day all begin with the words: "Stir up..." In other words, while we wait in the gathering darkness, we ask God to "stir up" within us the confidence and trust we need to sustain us. That cry for God's sometimes comforting and sometimes "awe-some" presence to be "stirred up within us" is particularly relevant in these days of the pandemic while we wait—yet not for yesterday, but for tomorrow; not for the return of the "old world/old normal/old ways" but for the promised arrival or coming or "in-breaking" of a "new world/new kingdom/new reign".

Today, the first of the four weeks of Advent, begins a new journey through the church year with our guide and companion, St. Mark. Mark's Gospel, the shortest of the four Gospels, is the oldest and, therefore, one of the primary sources used by both Matthew and Luke in the writing of their Gospels.

Several distinguishing characteristics of Mark are his frequent use of the word "immediately"—an indication that Mark's Jesus is in a hurry, seemingly well-aware that he is destined to get to the purpose for which he came into the world—that is, his passion and death. And when that time comes, Mark slows down dramatically, spending the last half of his gospel on that significant event.

Another noticeable difference from the other Gospel writers is that, in Mark, there are no stories of Jesus' birth or his early life. Instead, Mark begins his story with the call of John the Baptist, and then moves quickly through Jesus' baptism and his time in the wilderness in order to proclaim Jesus' first public words which characterize the heart of Mark's Gospel: "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news."

Mark's Gospel also portrays a very human Jesus who displays disappointment, frustration (with his disciples) and conflict with the religious leaders over their use of the laws regulating daily life which prohibit the virtues of compassion, kindness and the welfare of others. Through Jesus' intentionally difficult-to-understand teachings, Mark hints at Jesus' reluctance to promote his identity as the Messiah out of "fear" at what it will mean in terms of his suffering—a reality expressed only in Mark's where Jesus speaks only once while on the cross—his cry: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

And last, but not least, Mark's Gospel contains no stories about the resurrection and resurrection appearances. In fact, his Gospel ends with these "troubling" words about the women who came to the tomb on Easter morning: "They went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid."
