Fourth Sunday in Advent December 20, 2020 Living Faith Lutheran Church Davis Bay, BC

One of the themes of the four Sundays in Advent is "waiting"—waiting with hope and longing for the coming into the world of the Light of the World. Although it has a rather subdued tone (much of Advent music is written in the minor key), it is not a penitential season as is Lent. The colour of Advent, royal blue, is the colour of hope. The use of the Advent wreath and the lighting of one (more) candle each Sunday encourages us as we wait. Advent's Prayers of the Day all begin with the words: "Stir up. . ." In other words, while we wait in the gathering darkness, we ask God to "stir up" within us the confidence and trust we need to sustain us. That cry for God's sometimes comforting and sometimes "awe-some" presence to be "stirred up within us" is particularly relevant in these days of the pandemic while we wait—yet not for yesterday, but for tomorrow; not for the return of the "old world/old normal/old ways" but for the promised arrival or coming or "in-breaking" of a "new world/new kingdom/new reign".

WORD

First Reading 2 Samuel 7:1-11, 16

Now when the king was settled in his house, and the LORD had given him rest from all his enemies around him, ²the king said to the prophet Nathan, "See now, I am living in a house of cedar, but the ark of God stays in a tent." ³Nathan said to the king, "Go, do all that you have in mind; for the LORD is with you."

⁴But that same night the word of the LORD came to Nathan: ⁵Go and tell my servant David: Thus says the LORD: Are you the one to build me a house to live in? ⁶I have not lived in a house since the day I brought up the people of Israel from Egypt to this day, but I have been moving about in a tent and a tabernacle. ⁷Wherever I have moved about among all the people of Israel, did I ever speak a word with any of the tribal leaders of Israel, whom I commanded to shepherd my people Israel, saying, "Why have you not built me a house of cedar?" ⁸Now therefore thus you shall say to my servant David: Thus says the LORD of hosts: I took you from the pasture, from following the sheep to be prince over my people Israel; ⁹and I have been with you wherever you went, and have cut off all your enemies from before you; and I will make for you a great name, like the name of the great ones of the earth. ¹⁰And I will appoint a place for my people Israel and will plant them, so that they may live in their own place, and be disturbed no more; and evildoers shall afflict them no more, as formerly, ¹¹from the time that I appointed judges over my people Israel; and I will give you rest from all your enemies. Moreover the LORD declares to you that the LORD will make you a house. ¹⁶Your house and your kingdom shall be made sure forever before me; your throne shall be established forever.

Lighting of the Advent wreath

We praise you, O God, for this wheel of time that marks our days of preparation for Christ's advent. As we light the candles on this wreath, open our eyes to see your presence in the lowly ones of this earth. Enlighten us with your grace, that we may sing of your advent among us in the Word made flesh. Grant this through Christ our Lord, whose coming is certain and whose day draws near. **Amen.** *4 Candles are lit*

Second Reading Romans 16:25-27

²⁵Now to God who is able to strengthen you according to my gospel and the proclamation of Jesus Christ, according to the revelation of the mystery that was kept secret for long ages ²⁶but is now disclosed, and through the prophetic writings is made known to all the Gentiles, according to the command of the eternal God, to bring about the obedience of faith — ²⁷to the only wise God, through Jesus Christ, to whom be the glory forever! Amen.

Gospel Acclamation Let your steadfast love come to us, O Lord. Save us as you promised; we will trust your word.

The response to the announcement of the Gospel is **Glory to you**, **O** Lord. The response after the reading of the Gospel is **Praise to you**, **O** Christ.

Holy Gospel Luke 1:26-38

²⁶In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth,
²⁷To a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary.
²⁸And he came to her and said, "Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you."
²⁹But she was much perplexed by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be.
³⁰The angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God.
³¹And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus.
³²He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give to him the throne of his ancestor David.
³³He will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end."
³⁴Mary said to the angel, "How can this be, since I am a virgin?"

Hear this community of faith, O God, as we pray for families and friends who gather this season, and at this time, not as in the past but as they and we are able, and for those who will work or serve others this Christmas and not able to be with those they love. Let the peace of Emmanuel, God-with-us, shine in every heart. Lord, in your mercy, **hear our prayer.**

Postlude

Dismissal

Go in peace. Share the gift of Jesus. Thanks be to God.

In Luke's first words about Mary, she sounds unflappable. In most scripture stories, a visit from an angel provokes terror, but when the angel Gabriel appears to Mary, she isn't scared. She's curious. Even when the angel delivers the astonishing news that she will become pregnant with the Son of the Most High God whose glorious kingdom will never end, her response is a simple question: "How can this be?"

The angel reminds her that God's powerful Spirit works in mysterious ways. Anything is possible with God! That's all the explanation Mary needs. "Here I am," she declares. She is God's servant, and she is up for the task. What courage it must have taken to say yes!

Mary found strength in the knowledge that she was not alone. The first thing the angel said to her was: "The Lord is with you" (Luke 1:28). Mary knew that she was held in God's presence even before she understood what lay ahead of her. She was "favoured" by God, seen and known and loved. Whatever future she was called into, she could trust the one who led her. That faith is the foundation for Mary's "Yes."

Like Mary, we, too, are servants of the Most High God, who calls us into "ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown" (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, pp. 304, 317). Even when we don't feel quite as composed as Mary, we can trust in the same promise she did: we are loved by the God who makes impossible things possible and goes with us into whatever our futures hold.
