First Lesson Jeremiah 31:7-14

⁷For thus says the LORD: Sing aloud with gladness for Jacob, and raise shouts for the chief of the nations; proclaim, give praise, and say, "Save, O LORD, your people, the remnant of Israel."

⁸See, I am going to bring them from the land of the north, and gather them from the farthest parts of the earth, among them the blind and the lame, those with child and those in labor, together; a great company, they shall return here.

⁹With weeping they shall come, and with consolations I will lead them back, I will let them walk by brooks of water, in a straight path in which they shall not stumble; for I have become a father to Israel, and Ephraim is my firstborn.

¹⁰Hear the word of the LORD, O nations, and declare it in the coastlands far away; say, "The One who scattered Israel will gather him, and will keep him as a shepherd a flock."

¹¹For the LORD has ransomed Jacob, and has redeemed him from hands too strong for him.

¹²They shall come and sing aloud on the height of Zion, and they shall be radiant over the goodness of the LORD, over the grain, the wine, and the oil, and over the young of the flock and the herd; their life shall become like a watered garden, and they shall never languish again.

Second Lesson Ephesians 1:3-14

³Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, ⁴just as he chose us in Christ before the foundation of the world to be holy and blameless before him in love. ⁵God destined us for adoption as God's children through Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of God's will, ⁶to the praise of God's glorious grace that was freely bestowed on us in the Beloved.

⁷In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace ⁸that God lavished on us. With all wisdom and insight ⁹God has made known to us the mystery of the divine will, according to God's good pleasure set forth in Christ, ¹⁰as a plan for the fullness of time, to gather up all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth. ¹¹In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of the One who accomplishes all things according to God's counsel and will, ¹²so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory.

¹³In Christ you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; ¹⁴this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of God's glory.

²He was in the beginning with God. ³All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being ⁴in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. ⁵The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

¹⁶From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. ¹⁷The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. ¹⁸No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made God known.

You may find the excerpt on the next page something well worth rejoicing over and meditating upon at the beginning of this new year. It is taken from a book by Paul Tillich, one of the most famous and influential theologians of the 20^{th} century. It was typed out by a very dear friend of mine, the Rev. Ken Harris who died this past spring. He was someone who found considerable comfort and hope in Tillich's emphasis on "You are accepted". I hope you find it equally comforting and hopeful.

Grace strikes us when we are in great pain and restlessness. It strikes us when we walk through the dark valley of a meaningless and empty life. It strikes us when we feel that our separation is deeper than usual, because we have violated another life, a life which we loved, or from which we were estranged. It strikes us when our disgust for our own being. our indifference, our weakness, our hostility, and our lack of direction and composure have become intolerable to us. It strikes us when, year after year, the longed-for perfection of life does not appear, when the old compulsions reign within us as they have for decades, when despair destroys all joy and courage. Sometimes at that moment a wave of light breaks into our darkness, and it is as though a voice were saying: "You are accepted, accepted by that which is greater than you, and the name of which you do not know. Do not ask for the name now; perhaps you will find it later. Do not try to do anything now; perhaps later you will do much. Do not seek for anything; do not perform anything; do not intend anything. Simply accept the fact that you are accepted!" If that happens to us we experience grace. After such an experience we may not be better than before, and we may not believe more than before. But everything is transformed. In that moment, grace conquers sin, and reconciliation bridges the gulf of estrangement. And nothing is demanded of this experience, no religious or moral or intellectual presupposition, nothing but acceptance.

Some important (and not-so-important) announcements

Beginning this Sunday, January 3, we will no longer "record and post" our zoom worship on our parish website. The time required of Gordon Bone to download, edit and upload the service (particularly when participants "unmute" themselves and their private comments and conversations need to be edited out). . .plus the recognition that very few people "visit and view" the posted service later on, have lead us to this decision. Our Sunday morning services will continue to be "zoomed" and we encourage all members and friends with internet access to join us on zoom and share our worship.

With the approval of Bishop Greg Mohr and the unanimous agreement of church council, the Rev. Glenn Inglis, an ordained Presbyterian minister, will join our pastoral staff. The initial sixmonth exploration of this "team ministry" will provide both Glenn and the congregation the opportunity to decide whether to extend that relationship into the future. If both parties agree to continue, the congregation will extend an official "call" to Glenn to serve as our second part-time pastor, working alongside Pastor Hergy.

Specific details of this present "interim" arrangement such as the number of hours per month and the compensation per hour will be provided to the congregation in due time once we all have a better idea of how this new relationship will work during the remaining months of the pandemic and its restrictions regarding gatherings for worship and study as well as visitation of members and friends. Please remember both Glenn and Hergy (as well as our musician, Val Rutter and our office administrator, Lisa Moore) with your prayers, encouragement and support.

If any members (or acquaintances of members) have candle stubs (any colour or shape or size) that are no longer used and taking up space in drawers or ready to be thrown out, please bring them in a bag or box and drop them off at the church (perhaps by the back doors). We have someone who uses candle wax as part of a "home project". You may either email or phone Lisa Moore or Pastor Hergy to let them know you have delivered a package. Thank you.

Finally, Pastor Hergy hopes that many of you are willing to fill out a short questionnaire on the following page and send the replies to him by email (or deliver a printout and put it in the mailbox outside the office door). Your responses will be helpful in planning our worship for the remaining months prior to our resumption of "normal" in-person worship (whenever the Provincial Health Authorities permit us to do so).
