Living Faith Lutheran Church Sunday After Easter April 19, 2020

We are gathered together in worship ... although worshipping separately! Christ is risen! Alleluia! He is risen indeed, Alleluia!

(pause a moment and "listen" to Val play Amazing Grace!) In today's Gospel the risen Christ appears to His disciples and offers them the gifts of peace and hope and gives them His Spirit. We experience the resurrection in our Sunday worship and in our everyday lives. It's a wonderful gift to know the risen and living Saviour, who gives us the same gifts in our baptism.

Gathering Hymn: 389 Christ is Alive! Let Christians Sing

Christ is alive! Let Christians sing. The cross stands empty to the sky. Let streets and homes with praises ring. Love, drowned in death, shall never die.

Christ is alive! No longer bound, to distant years in Palestine, but saving, healing, here and now, and touching every place and time.

In every insult, rift and war, where colour, scorn or wealth divide, Christ suffers still, yet loves the more, and lives where even hope has died.

Women and men, in age and youth, can feel the Spirit, hear the call, and find the way, the life, the truth, revealed in Jesus, freed for all.

Christ is alive and comes to bring good news to this and every age, till earth and sky and ocean ring with joy, with justice, love and praise.

Confession and Absolution:

Lord God, You not only show us how to obey Your word, but You help us to obey and live it. You not only show us how to love, but You help us to be loving. Jesus, You taught Your disciples and You teach us also, to see the lives of others through Your eyes. We confess that we are not perfect. We have said and done things we regret. Too often we have resisted Your call to be Your voice in the world. Forgive us loving God. Give us Your righteousness, the strength to give our failures to You, and the courage each day to try again. O Lord, open our ears to really hear You, and our eyes to see Your way for us as we live resurrection lives. In the name of Jesus, Amen

People of God, receive the good news: God turns to us in love and tells us, "I will put my spirit in you, and you shall live." All our sin is forgiven in the name of Jesus Christ, who is the free and abounding gift of God's grace or us. Accept His forgiving love and know His peace. Amen

Prayer of the Day:

Holy and loving God, You are the strength of all who believe and the hope of all those who doubt. We have not seen the scarred hands of the risen Jesus. We have not touched His wounds, but we have faith that believes that Jesus lives and His words of peace and His gift of the Spirit are His gifts to us today. Those are the gifts that set us free to be Your people in our day. Thank You, Lord. In Jesus' name, Amen

First Reading: Acts 2:14a, 22-32

After the Holy Spirit came to the apostles on Pentecost, Peter preaches a powerful Gospel message ... that Jesus who died was raised from the dead by God.

¹⁴ Then Peter stood up with the 11 apostles. In a loud voice he spoke to the crowd. "My fellow Jews," he said, "let me explain this to you. All of you who live in Jerusalem, listen carefully to what I say.

²² "Fellow Israelites, listen to this! Jesus of Nazareth was a man who had God's approval. God did miracles, wonders and signs among you through Jesus. You yourselves know this. ²³ Long ago God planned that Jesus would be handed over to you. With the help of evil people, you put Jesus to death. You nailed him to the cross. ²⁴ But God raised him from the dead. He set him free from the suffering of death. It wasn't possible for death to keep its hold on Jesus. ²⁵ David spoke about him. He said,

"'I know that the Lord is always with me.

Because he is at my right hand, I will always be secure.

- ²⁶ So my heart is glad and joy is on my tongue. My whole body will be full of hope.
- ²⁷ You will not leave me in the place of the dead. You will not let your holy one rot away.

²⁸ You always show me the path that leads to life.

You will fill me with joy when I am with you.' (Psalm 16:8–11)

²⁹ "Fellow Israelites, you can be sure that King David died. He was buried. His tomb is still here today. ³⁰ But David was a prophet. He knew that God had made a promise to him. God had promised that he would make someone in David's family line king after him. ³¹ David saw what was coming. So he spoke about the Messiah rising from the dead. He said that the Messiah would not be left in the place of the dead. His body wouldn't rot in the ground. ³² God has raised this same Jesus back to life. We are all witnesses of this.

Second Reading: 1 Peter 1:3-9 Peter Peter Praises God for the Living Hope we have through

Christ's resurrection even in the midst of difficult circumstances.

³ Give praise to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. In his great mercy he has given

us a new birth and a living hope. This hope is living because Jesus Christ rose from the dead. ⁴ He has given us new birth so that we might share in what belongs to him. This is a gift that can never be destroyed. It can never spoil or even fade away. It is kept in heaven for you. ⁵ Through faith you are kept safe by God's power. Your salvation is going to be completed. It is ready to be shown to you in the last days. ⁶ Because you know all this, you have great joy. You have joy even though you may have had to suffer for a little while. You may have had to suffer sadness in all kinds of trouble. ⁷ Your troubles have come in order to prove that your faith is real. Your faith is worth more than gold. That's because gold can pass away

even when fire has made it pure. Your faith is meant to bring praise, honor and glory to God. This will happen when Jesus Christ returns. ⁸ Even though you have not seen him, you love him. Though you do not see him now, you believe in him. You are filled with a glorious joy that can't be put into words. ⁹ You are receiving the salvation of your souls. This salvation is the final result of your faith.

Gospel Alleluia – say together:

We come to the Word to hear God's call to service We come to meet the Christ who claims us We come, rejoicing that God cares for us We come for we are not our own ... God's love has made us His!

The Gospel: John 20:19-31 The risen Jesus appears to His disciples offering them a benediction of peace, a commission, and the gift of the Holy Spirit.

¹⁹On the evening of that first day of the week, the disciples were together. They had locked the doors because they were afraid of the Jewish leaders. Jesus came in and stood among them. He said, "May peace be with you!" ²⁰ Then he showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were very happy when they saw the Lord.

²¹ Again Jesus said, "May peace be with you! The Father has sent me. So now I am sending you." ²² He then breathed on them. He said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³ If you forgive anyone's sins, their sins are forgiven. If you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven."

Jesus Appears to Thomas

²⁴ Thomas was one of the 12 disciples. He was also called Didymus. He was not with the other disciples when Jesus came. ²⁵ So they told him, "We have seen the Lord!"

But he said to them, "First I must see the nail marks in his hands. I must put my finger where the nails were. I must put my hand into his side. Only then will I believe."

²⁶ A week later, Jesus' disciples were in the house again. Thomas was with them. Even though the doors were locked, Jesus came in and stood among them. He said, "May peace be with you!" ²⁷ Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here. See my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Stop doubting and believe. ²⁸ Thomas said to him, "My Lord and my God!" ²⁹ Then Jesus told him, "Because you have seen me, you have believed. Blessed are those who have not seen me but still have believed."

³⁰ Jesus performed many other signs in front of his disciples. They are not written down in this book. ³¹ But these are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God. If you believe this, you will have life because you belong to him.

Sermon: Easter Changes Everything! John 20:19-31

Alleluia. Christ is risen! The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia!

Those are "Good News" words, aren't they? Speaking them makes us smile!

- they are words of good news ... and don't we need good news ... especially these times?
- this is the Good News of Easter! ... it's the best of news ... it's news to share, for sure!

Alleluia. Christ is risen. The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia

- it just sort of rolls off the tongue, doesn't it? Alleluia. Christ is risen. The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia!
- it was the highpoint of last week's Easter liturgy ... it was today's opening acclamation and will be for the next several weeks

- but here's what I wonder ... is it really that simple? That easy?
 - it's our Easter profession of faith ... a statement of our belief in the resurrection ... but it can be a statement that is often easier said than done ...
 - it's one thing to say the words, another to live them!

There is a similarity between the first believers and us today ...

- it has to do with fear ... today we find the disciples gathered behind locked doors
- our fears are different though ... they feared their government officials, physical violence ...
- we don't share those fears ... we have fear of the insidious virus that doesn't care where it goes ...
 it thrives on anything it touches ...
- our fears are loss of jobs, sickness, loneliness, loss of purpose and joy, devastations, empty streets, empty churches, empty table

But **Easter changes everything** ... it renews our hope ... we know our "today" is not the end of the story

- the Easter message is for all of us ... "He is not here ... He is risen! Do not be afraid" ... those words are "gift" to us too
- we have the promise that the very real things we face are not the end of the story ...
 - we need not fear ... and because Jesus lives, our story will continue ...
- these things today are not the only reality, the prime reality ... like the disciples, we too have a calling, a mission to fulfill ... Jesus has sent us!
 - we have His story to keep on telling! And our own resurrection story to keep on living!

Today in our Gospel we return with the disciples to that earlier day ...

- they are fear-filled, locked in ... they are locked in fear
- John says they are afraid ... they are hiding ... they've locked the doors of their house
- enter Thomas ... what facts come to mind when you hear his name? He was a doubter. "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side ... I will not believe."
 - that fact is so prevalent that we call him Doubting Thomas.
- that's when Jesus shows up, and speaks His word of "Peace" to them ...
 - Jesus shows them his hands and his side and then gives the Holy Spirit to them
- Jesus reminds them who He is ... because they had trouble believing
 - and today, don't we know people who also need reminding of who Jesus is?
- the Word today reminds us that Jesus meets us too ... right where we are, and at just the right times ... and it is *there* ... like the fear-filled disciples ... we will see Jesus!
 - there ... we too will hear again His words of promise ...
 - there ... in our fears, questions, doubts ... Jesus breathes His life into us ... just as He did for the disciples

We know Doubting Thomas but let's not forget Confessing Thomas ... he's in today's Gospel - his words: "My Lord and my God!"

- and with those words Thomas has recognized and named a new relationship, a new worldview, a new way of being.

Do you know the rest of Thomas' story? Do you know what he did, where and how he died?

- He died in India. He was the apostle to the people of India; He brought the Gospel of Christ to India.
- He died a martyr after he was run through with five spears by five soldiers
- really, that doesn't sound much like a doubter ... it sounds like someone for whom the resurrection of Christ was real, someone for whom the empty tomb made a difference and became his story! **Easter changes everything!**

There's a difference between *facts* and *story*.

- facts inform the mind, stories touch the heart. Facts transmit information, stories transform lives ...
 the empty tomb is a fact ... but Resurrection is a story ... a real story
- so maybe we need to understand resurrection as the story of our life instead of a snapshot of Christ's life ...
- the *fact* of the empty tomb is not the story of the resurrection and the *facts* of Jesus life are not the story of Jesus ...
 - just as the facts of your life and my life are not the story of our life

The facts are just the starting point for the story. The fact of the empty tomb is the starting point for the resurrection story.

- whatever facts you woke up to on Easter Monday are simply the starting point for your story of resurrection ... and we all have our starting places!
- what is your starting place? ... whatever your life is today, whatever your circumstances are ... that's the starting point for the next chapter of your story of resurrection
- if you're dealing with deep loneliness, sorrow and loss, fear, confusion or darkness ...
 - that's your starting point ... and that's the room which Jesus enters this Easter
- perhaps illness, old age, disability, or uncertainty are facts of your life ...
 - that's your starting point and the place in which Jesus stands with you now ...
- and if joy, gratitude, and celebration are the facts of your life today, that's the starting point for your story of resurrection now

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Have you ever considered the incredible audacity of those words?

- have you thought about the reaction of those first followers of Jesus to those words?
- the odds against them were enormous ... really, their prospects looked dismal!
- these followers were a tiny minority made up of nobodies ... facing powerful people who wanted them silenced ... some wanted them dead!
- but these disciples persisted ... and the Book of Acts and the Epistles remind us the church grew!

How in the world did that happen? Well, read again Peter's sermon (Second Reading)

- as Christians in today's society seeing increasing antagonistic attitudes toward the church ... wouldn't we like to know!
- just the week before Easter the disciples had experienced much disappointment, guilt and sorrow
- but ... on Easter morning they were gifted with Alleluias!
 - the pain of the past faded away in the glory of the risen Lord Jesus
 - and neither their failings, their grief, fears or their doubts could prevent what God had promised
- keep on reading in the Book of Acts and other Epistles and we see they were to face more trouble and anguish ... even chained in prison they praised Him!
- they suffered willingly for Jesus, because He had won for them all of God's grace and mercy.

- their story makes us want to let the resurrection so grip us and convince us of God's great promises!

Easter changes everything! Easter changes us!

We realize of course, that it was by the power of the Holy Spirit that such things are accomplished

- but I believe another very important factor had a part in that early Church growth activity ...
 - that Alleluia morning ... Easter ... that glorious day ... that miracle of miracles ...
- it was the resurrection of Jesus that truly gripped and empowered those disciples and the early Church for their ministry and mission in a hostile world
- the resurrection was the centerpiece of their preaching ... because it had changed their lives! ... indeed ... Easter changes everything!
- and as we by faith also fully embrace anew the reality of our Lord's resurrection ... it does the same for us!
 - those disciples were Easter people ... and so are we!

The walls and the locked doors of their house could not keep Jesus out.

- and the Easter Good News is ... Jesus steps into the midst of our "house" too
 - and breathes peace and life into us ... He breathes peace and hope into us ...
 - He breathes peace and courage into us ... He breathes peace and strength into us!
- so take a deep breath, take it all in, let it fill and enliven you ... Let it give you hope, courage, and strength to open the doors of your life ... to begin a new chapter to your story!

The Easter message is for everyone, everywhere ... it's a powerful message ... it's the answer to the most universal of human fears and problems: death comes to all ... but that's not the last word!

- Easter, therefore, is for all people ... our family, our neighbours, where we do our business
- the disciples of the risen Jesus ... once they came out of their locked room ... they knew they had the answer that everyone, everywhere needed: life, new life in the risen, living Jesus!
- they had fresh hope! A fresh vision of their future! The very real promise of Jesus with them!
 - and we see they just couldn't keep it to themselves!

Easter changes everything ... Easter changes us ... Easter is for everyone Alleluia. Christ is risen ... The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia

Hymn of the Day: When Thomas Heard from Jesus (Tune- Aurelia: The Church's One Foundation)

When Thomas heard from Jesus, "Now come and follow me,"
